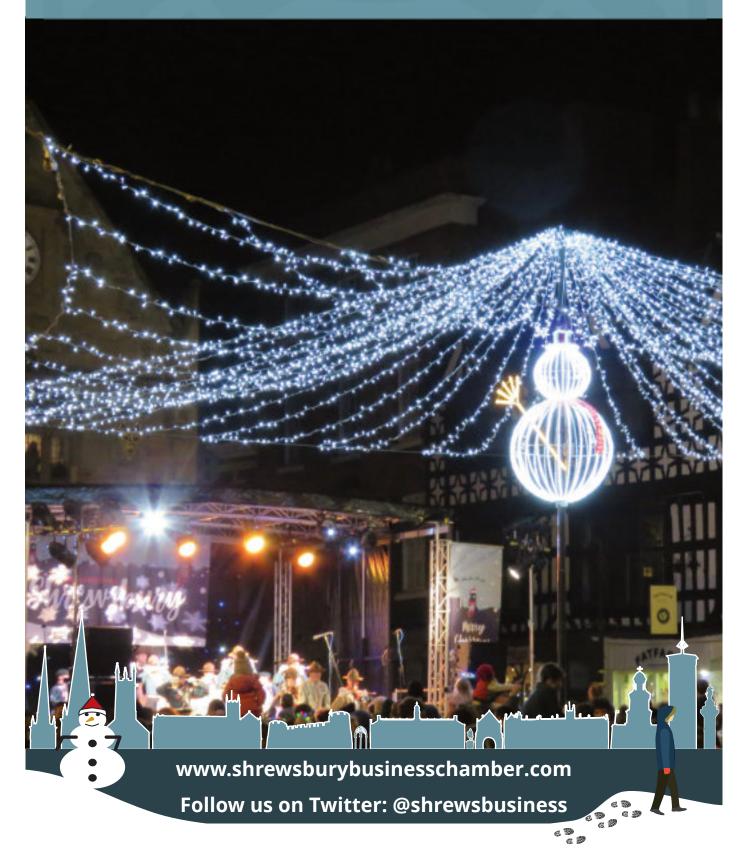

Grant funding available for small and medium enterprises

Up to £50,000 funding is available for Innovation of low carbon products and services. The Low Carbon Opportunities Programme is working in partnership with Shropshire Council to provide revenue and capital support to enterprises in Shrewsbury and across the county. The funds will help SME's who are developing low carbon goods and services to implement ideas and commercialise products that reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Capital and revenue grants of up to £50,000 (at 40% intervention) are available. Smaller grants can also be applied for.

Local constituents warm up for December General Election with hustings debate

The NHS, Adult Social Care, Brexit and more were passionately discussed in great depth at a Shrewsbury & Atcham Constituency General Election hustings event, which was hosted by Shrewsbury Business Chamber.

About 250 constituency voters from across the political spectrum attended the 'open' meeting at Shrewsbury College and were able to put their questions to the five candidates: Daniel Kawczynski (Conservative), Hannah Locke (Independent), Dr Julia Buckley (Labour), Julian Dean (Green) and Nat Green (Liberal Democrat) in a lively but good natured debate that was facilitated by well known financial services commentator Ed Marshall from Kingsland Wealth Management.

With 20 days to polling day, the candidates were looking to make a good impression to voters in what could be considered to be a critical election in shaping the country for generations to come.

Whilst national issues around Brexit and the NHS were discussed, many of the audience were keen to hear each candidates positions on local issues including the state of adult social care, the Future Fit hospital debate and the need for more local

initiatives to address the Global Climate Emergency.

In responding to questions about what they would do to support businesses in Shrewsbury, candidates outlined their proposals which included upskilling the work force; providing bursaries for training and helping to improve the digital infrastructure.

With some young voters in the audience, candidates were also questioned on what they would do to support young people if they were elected. The candidates acknowledge these as the future of the country who need support and investment. Increases to the living wage, reductions in income tax for lower earners and free bus travel to under 25 were all considered.

Val Edwards, Chair of Shrewsbury Business Chamber concluded the night by thanking everyone who was in attendance and Shrewsbury Colleges Group for hosting the meeting. She added "The Chamber was pleased to organise this event as part of our annual programme which promotes Shrewsbury as a business centre, and the importance of local businesses to the community."

Climate Emergency: Actions for Business

We are all aware that the challenges facing our planet are worrying.

The presentation given by Mandy Stoker and Deb Cairns from E4 Environment and Robin Mager from Shropshire wildlife Trust did not gloss over the issues, but gave us some background into why organisations such as extinction rebellion (XR) are demonstrating in order to make us all aware of how fast the climate is changing.

There are ways in which we can assess and measure our commitment to making our

businesses greener and the Green Achiever scheme from E4 Environment is one of them – this assesses

what we have already achieved, what changes we are committed to make and what we can do in the future.

Having a good environmental policy can help us to gain more business as well as helping to slow down climate change. There are already laws which we need to adhere to regarding disposal of waste and there was an opportunity at the end of the presentation whereby we were able to

share frustrations regarding disposal of business waste, and good practices used within our businesses.



Meeting with Clive Wright and Peter Nutting

On Wednesday 13th November we welcomed Shropshire Council leader Peter Nutting and Chief Executive Clive Wright to our networking event.

After a fantastic buffet, Peter took to the stage to talk about the council's plans for Shrewsbury and other parts of Shropshire moving towards the new year.

The biggest priority is to look at how they can improve accessibility to the town centre and develop services such as the park and ride which now has fallen to 600,000 users a year over the Meole Brace, Oxon and Harlescott sites.

There is hope for the North West Relief Road to be successfully completed and in 2023 there is a real prospect of it being a reality. This could take a large amount of traffic from Smithfield Road and ease the burden on the town centre.

The Council also hope to announce their plans for developing the Riverside, Pride Hill and Darwin shopping centres in the near future. Attracting popular national retailers and food outlets is seen as important to retaining business within the town.

It was acknowledged that parking provision in the town centre is a real concern. The multi-story car park does need to be replaced in the near future, which the Council are considering

options for. There will be a need to provide more car parking spaces in the town whilst the redevelopment is taking place.

Shrewsbury Business Park restaurant nearing completion

Building work is nearing completion on a new restaurant/public house built to a stunning design by Walker Hay Architects at Shrewsbury Business Park offering approx. 430 sq (4,300 sq ft) gross internal space.



Built by Matrix Construction, the scheme is an Alaska Property Group development in partnership with Shropshire Council and funded by a local family.

Letting agents, Cooper Green Pooks are seeking restaurant/public house operators who would fit out the building to their own specification on completion of the construction work. The asking rent is £60,000pa exclusive and there is scope to split the building into two units.

Charles Howell from Cooper Green Pooks who is handling the letting said "This building offers a much-needed facility for Shrewsbury Business Park and will serve the established residential areas off Wenlock Road and the new housing developments nearby."

Katy Jones, Managing Director of PC Net Solutions



Tell me a bit about you and what you do for as living?

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Ransomware Attacks Are on the Rise: Prevention Tips

While cyber-incidents of any form are a rising concern for organisations in the UK, recent research revealed that a specific type of attack is escalating at an alarming rate: ransomware. This malicious software typically invades a victim's device through disguised downloads or email attachments, disables the device's anti-malware software and lays dormant until activated by the cyber-criminal who created it. Once activated, the ransomware is able to encrypt every file on the device and force the victim pay a ransom—often with cryptocurrency (eg bitcoin)—to have their files properly restored.

The UK was the biggest global target for ransomware attacks in the first half of 2019—with the number of ransomware incidents increasing by 195 per cent when compared to last year's totals, according to SonicWall. What's worse, ransomware attacks

are known to result in more costly consequences than the average cyber-incident due to the additional risk of having to pay a ransom to restore stolen data.

Consider the following guidance to keep your organisation from becoming another statistic and the next victim of a ransomware attack:

1) Software updates—It's vital to routinely update your cyber-security software (eg firewalls, anti-malware or

anti-virus software) on all devices to properly protect against ransomware.

- 2) Staff training—Be sure to provide routine cybersecurity training for all employees to ensure they are capable of reducing ransomware risks. Specifically, employees should know how to detect phishing scams to prevent ransomware from invading organisational devices through email attachments.
- 3) Device controls—Consider implementing a security feature on all workplace devices that filters employees' web browsing traffic and blocks malicious websites.

This will help prevent the risk of employees accidentally downloading ransomware.

4) Back-up systems—In order to decrease your vulnerability during a ransomware attack, establish a secure back-up location for storing data. Doing so will protect you from having to pay a costly ransom if your

devices are compromised.

5) Response planning—To help limit the consequences of a potential cyber-attack, create a cyber-incident response plan and test the plan regularly with staff for effectiveness.
